TOLEDO, March 10.—Ald. Spence, Secretary of the Dominion Alliance, has received from Sir Wilfrid Laurier the answer of the government to the request of the alliance that a prohibition measure ...

The Premier concludes his communication to Ald. Spence as follows: "I venture to submit for your consideration, and the consideration of the members of the Dominion Alliance, who believe in prohibition as the most efficient means of suppressing the evils of intemperance, that no good purpose would be served by forcing upon the people a measure which is shown by the vote to have the support of less than twenty-three per cent. of the electorate."

THURSDAY, MARCH 16, 1899. NOTES AND COMMENTS. The Manitoba Government is to consider a redistribution bill giving representation to the newly-settled districts in the North.

THE POSTMASTER-GENERAL HAS EXTENDED THE POSTAL NETWORK TO A LARGE NUMBER OF OFFICERS NOT HISTORICALLY COVERED BY PRIVILEGES, SO THAT IN A VERY FEW CASES IT WILL BE NECESSARY TO SEND POSTAGE STAMPS FOR SMALL AMOUNTS.

Adj. Gen. Corbin has issued a statement giving the number of deaths of United States soldiers killed for the Spanish war and the causes thereof from May 1st, 1898, to February 28, 1899. It shows: Killed in action, 820; died of wounds, 126; died of disease, 5,277. Total, 6,223.

THE CITIZENS OF PORT WRAIGEL, ALASKA, ARE SAYING BY LATE ARRIVAL FROM THE NORTH TO BE DRAWING UP A PETITION ASKING THE U.S. COMMISSIONER TO CANCEL THEIR TOWN CHARTER.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has definitely stated the intentions of the Government on the subject of a prohibition measure. His declaration is to the effect that the result of the plebiscite vote would not justify the Government in introducing such a bill. This answer to the request of the Dominion Alliance for immediate action in the matter is contained in a letter to Mr. B. Spence, secretary of the alliance, from Sir Wilfrid Laurier himself.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT TO-DAY.

OTAWA, March 16.—Everything is now in readiness for the opening of the House of Commons to-morrow. The session is expected to be one of unusual interest.
