NOTES AND COMMENTS.  
The canal advisory board, appointed by Governor Roosevelt of New York, three weeks ago, Messrs. Bond, state engineer and surveyor; and John N. Partridge, state superintendent of public works, will investigate the canal problem on May 10. It is their purpose to commence their work by an inspection of the canal of the Dominion of Canada. They will investigate the construction, improvement and commerce of those waterways.

**THE PACIFIC CABLE DISCUSSED.**  
OTTAWA, April 26.—In accordance with the understanding reached by Sir Charles Tupper, the resolutions in the matter of the Pacific cable and the purchase of the Dominion County Railway will be taken up to-morrow. The Dominion county resolution will first be taken up. It is not anticipated that the discussion on this subject will be as all prolonged in either house, and if any further argument in its favor were needed it would be found in the swelling revenues of the road, which the Minister of Railways will be able to inform parliament. The Senate is expected to support the resolution, and to report its approval of two years ago to the ratification of the arrangement.

**THE ESTIMATES FOR THE YEAR.**  
The Finance Minister laid upon the table of the House on Monday night, last, before adjournment, his estimates for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1910. Mr. Fielding is asking for a total of \$40,288,500, or a net decrease, compared with the amount voted last session for the current fiscal year, of \$1,018,988. The decrease in capital expenditure is estimated at \$2,177,721, the increase in consolidated fund expenditures \$568,486, leaving the net decrease as stated.

**MILITIA INCREASES.**  
The total increase of \$175,000 in the militia cost, is explained by the following increases in detail: Pay and allowances for 1910, \$1,000,000; salaries, \$1,000,000; military properties and rifle ranges, \$88,000; stores, \$60,000; provisions and supplies, \$16,000; transport, \$10,000; miscellaneous, \$5,000; Royal Military College, \$15,000; Government ordnance factory, \$75,000; defense of the coast, \$22,000; monument for battle field, \$2800. Rifle Association grants are decreased \$8100, the D. R. A. joining \$6500, and the Artillery Association \$8000. For artillery and armaments \$886,000 is asked on capital account, an increase of \$104,000. It is proposed to fill the entire militia for 12 days each year. The sum of \$200,000 is asked for the Mounted Police in the Yukon, an increase of \$153,750, and a new vote of \$108,000 for a Yukon mail service.
