NOTES AND COMMENTS.

In the famine of 1892, \$60,000,00 was devoted by Russia for relief, but in 1886. the whole expenditure on agriculture, upon which 85 per cent. of the Russian people depend, was only \$22,500,000. In the same year the army and navy cost \$260,000,000.

F. W. Thompson, manager of the Ogilvie Flour Mills, reports the outlook for an immense wheat crop in Manitoba and the Territories. Present indications are for a crop of over 40,000,000 hushels, and, allowing for possible set-backs, it will exceed 85,000,00 anyway. Last year's crop. though unusually large, was only about

The Globe correspondent at Dawson City in his last letter, published on Monday, says: Any definite estimate of the gold output cannot be given before the 10th of Jone. By that time several of the richest claims will have paid their Government tithe, and some definite computation may be possible. But, as my telegram of the 25th, a speculative estimate from a reliable official source places the amount at between twenty and twenty-five millions.

From the assessment roll of the township of Esquesing the following interesting etatistics are gleaned: The population is 3,787. The Russian government has adopted . somewhat drastic measure in order to suppress Arunkenness in St. Petersburg. It has taken away from 25,000 shope the right to sell sloohollo liquors, and has replaced these by 5,000 establishments placed under the control of the state, and ifusted at equal distances apart. These relablishments are directed by young women. The liquor is delivered in bottles, to which is siffixed a government mark. The consumer can obtain only one bottle ip each shop, and if, when he visits another establishment, he shows the least sign of intexication, no liquor will be served bim.
