NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The Ontario Agricultural College has sent out a special bulletin to dairymen, announcing that the bacteriological department is ready to investigate any difficulties in the way of impure water, bad flavors, etc., at the factories, or bacterial infection of any kind. There can be no more important work than this done for our cheese factories and creameries. Makers frequently have difficulties in the way of bad flavors in the milk, cheese or butter, which, if placed in the hands of a skillful bacteriologist or chemist, valuable truths might be found out in addition to supplying means to remedy the difficulty. It is hoped that our dairymen will take advantage of Prof. Harriston's offer, as work of this nature will be of great value to the industry.

Prof. Robertson leaves for Great Britain about the middle of the month, in the interest of Canadian farm products, where it is expected that the good work accomplished last season by him will be repeated.
