In behalf of the Building Committee of the new Baptist Church, Mr. James McIntosh made application for a permit to erect a church edifice of stone and brick with sittings laid in mortar, on the corner of Hill and Elgin Streets. Moved by James Clark, seconded by J. A. Murray, that Henry Grindell be and is hereby appointed engineer for the proposed Department at a salary of \$500.00 per annum, payable quarterly; duties commencing 1st of July, 1899, subject to rules and regulations formulated June 20th, 1899; one month's notice given by Mr. Grindell or the Fire and Light Committee to terminate contract.
