Nearly All The Grain is Cut and Yields are Showing High. THE THRESHERS ARE AT WORK. WINNIPEO, Sept. 5 .- Reports of the pro-

gress of the harvest along the C. P. R. lines during the past week were received at the company's offices here last night. These reports show that 90 per cent. of the wheat crop in Manitoba has been out, also between 40 and 50 per cent. of the oats. In every district in the province there was not one station that did not report "which home here.

The reports show also that progress is also being made with the threshing, 35 per cent. of the stations reporting that the threshers are now at work. 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
