NOTES AND COMMENTS.

After three years of municipal partner ship the people of Allandale have voted to secode from the town of Barrie by 67 votes.

A cable from London describing the wool sales which opened there on the 19th says there is an advance of 10 to 15 per cent, on all lines of merinos, which is more than was expected. Canadian quotations of foreign wools are higher this week.

A total solar enlipse will take place i May, 1900, and astronomers are preparing to see it in the best places. European observers will locate themselves on the line of totality, where it passes through Spain. Another expedition will go to the United States and set up instruments in Georgia or North Carolina.

The espionage system, as revealed distasteful to Emperor William of Germany, who, it is said, had no idea that it was carried on to such an extent. He has, therefore, instructed Gen. Von Habnack, chief of the private military cabinet to take steps, as far as possible, to abolish the system.

The total amount of capital represented by the new companies of which notice of incorporation is given in this issue of the Ontario Gazette, reaches in round numbers fifteen and one-half million dollars, of which \$6,479,000 is taken up by mining enterprises. and \$8,068,000 by general industrial and commercial undertakings. The companies having their head office is Toronto represent a capital of \$10,760,000.

The Post-office Department is engaged preparing for bringing into force the amendation to the Post-office Act, passed last session, which provides for the insur ance of registered matter transmitted through the mails. The object of the amendment is to insure a letter or parcel to the value of \$15, by the payment of a small sum in addition to the registration fee of five cents. The regulations governing this insurance will be issued in the course of a few days.

Reliable reports from England state that negotiations with France over the French shore question have failed, and that the British Ministry will invite the Colonial Legislature at its next session to renew the modus vivendi about the lobster fishery slong the French shore. The colonial Government, it is announced will refuse to enact any such measure, on the ground that the report of the Royal Commission, which is held back by Mr Chamberlain, fully establishes the colony's

Storeyville sent up two hundred admirers of its team to obser them on to victory. Galt's delegation did not number more than a couple of dozen and though they made their presence pparent at the beginning of the struggle play had hardly begun before it became evident that Galt's admirers were not enjoying themselves to any considerable degree. The score at the close was 7 to 0

in favor of Acton. The game is easily described. It was contest between skill and speed on one side and main strength and roughness on the other. Their fleetness of foot alone saved Acton from being badly used up. At every possible opportunity the Galt players used the sticks on their opponents. The referee was indulgent, and only when Brush deliberately hammered his check until he fell to the ground did that official think it necessary to exercise his author-

Acton played clean lacrosse. They are speedy, earnest, skilful aggregation of players. If there are weak spots in the team they were not apparent on Saturday True, the shooting on goal was very poo at times, and made Acton's score much smaller than it should have been, but this deficiency may be attributed to indifference, as, after the first tally, it never looked as though Acton needed goals.

Galt, on the other hand, were unable to make any concerted and sustained attacks upon their opponents' goal and were equally incapable of defending their own citadel: The Galt team seemed to be at sixes and sevens. There was no pretty team work and barring little Pringle, very little individual play was worth while looking at.

Acton is to be congratulated on its second championship victory. The little town has given its lacrosse team noble support, and the boys have proved worthy of that support by playing fast, clean lacrosse all the time. The Herald's wish is that Acton may long be the home of the

Royal district championship." The Mercury says: "Owing to the protest of the Galt Lacrosse club being sustained against Acton, the game was ordered to be played over in this city on Saturday at the Maple Leaf grounds, and resulted in a walk over for Acton. 


