DISASTROUS REVERSES TO BRITISH FORCES.

Battalions and a Mountain Battery Captured by the

2000 TROOPS TAKEN PRISONERS LONDON, Nov. 1 .- (Special.) -The forecasts of defeat over which keen observers were brooding before midnight on Monday have been officially confirmed. Yes terday was the bluest and blackest day London has known since the first tidings of the Sepoy rebellion. The tidings that the Boers had out-mauoenvred General White, and while luring on the British centre and right had ambuscaded the left wing, out two battalions to pieces and forced them to surrender, together with a mountain battery, filled the streets with dismay and

A disaster which it is impossible to disguise or minimise has at length befellen the British arms in South Africa. The capture of two regiments and a battery after terrible slaughter has appulled England, and demonstrated what has been clear to dispassionate observers since active perations began, that the burghers are good strategists as well as splendid fighters.

The column which was reported missing n Monday night's despatches was surrounded by 10,000 to 15,000 Boers, and those who were not killed are prisomers of the enemy. The list of dead cannot be ascertained, as nothing has been received in London up to this hour, except Gen. White's message to the War Office, announcing the reverse. The loss of Boers is 900 to 1000.

LONDON, Nov. 1-About six thousand fresh troops will arrive at Cape Town on Sunday next, and will be available to reinforce Sir George White. Transports will arrive there daily after Sunday until, by the end of next week, 28,000 troops will have been landed in Bouth Africa. These men are intended for Gen. 
