SENT TO THE FRONT. The great battle at Modder River, re ferred to in last week's FREE PRESS, was the most eventful of the campriga-According to the latest accounts of the battle, the Boer fire was the bottest on record, and will revolutionize existing theories. It was effective up to 1,000 yards, but the casualties among the prope troops were trifling. It was found impossible to bring the British ammunition reserves to the firing line. BOTAL CANADIAN REGIMENT. The Canadian Contingent was given the most enthusiastic reception upon their arrival at Cape town accorded any troops which have landed at South Africa When the Bardinian was signalled from Table Mountain the popular enthusiasm became intense, and many hundreds o people made their way to the wharf to be first to obser the bearers of the visible belping hand from distant Canada. The town was decorated with bunting in their honor. Sir Alfred Miluer at Cape Town immediately cabled Lord Minto as follows : "Just said good-bye to Canadian contingent. All well and delighted to go to the front. People showed in unmistake-

able manner appreciation and sympathy and help of Canada in their hour of trial. The regiment has gone to the front to

reinforce Gen. Methuen. The Canadian Contingent are in good company. They will act in concert with the Black Watch and Scaforth High landers. A party of 89 Canadians remained at Cape Town, as the men had not passed the medical inspection. Private Declauriers died third day out from Quebec of heart failure.

THE BORRS AND THEIR POSITIONS. It is believed that the Boers had occupied the position seven weeks before, and had spent the interval in fortifying and rendering it, as they considered, impregnable. They did not seem to fear to expend their ammunition, and their guns were well and smartly handled. Some of the Boer prisoners say that Gen. Cronje was in supreme command. He had to whip his men to prevent them from deserting, and, despite this, many threw down their rifles and fied. 
