This is a cause worthy of the liberal support of all able to give for the relief of fellow subjects of His Majesty's empire.

The Telegram points out that Great Britain is represented in South Africa by colonial soldiers exceeding in number the total strength of the army which was sent to the Cape. The Australian Colonies have put a force of 7,000 men in the field, Metal and Cape Colonies, including the Ulsterlanders from Johannesburg, have brought over 25,000 volunteers to the colors. An army of 33,000 men from the Australian and Canadian nations and two of the South African colonies, has been really useful in military operations, and has been still more valuable as a proof that the Empire is united.

The officials are that the Boers will find themselves forced to form greater odds as the close of the campaign approaches, and that the British, with another base of operations, a mounted force will then work its way into Johannesburg—from Mafeking—and with Bullers coming in from Natal or round by Zululand and Roberts coming up from the Free State, the Boers will have no alternative but a speedy surrender.
