"Our Boys' First Engagement
With the Boers, at Victoria -
West."

The following from Gunner W. J. Moore,
dated Victoria West, Cape Colony, March
7th, will be read with interest:

We are just starting west from this point
and a few hours will be under fire from
the Cape rebels. Our advance guard has
just had a brush and killed 4, wounded 10
and captured 4, with loss of 2. We then
took to their trains in the mountains and
before sunset will be shelled by "10" before
they are well due in the ground.

Owing to the small attendance at the
meeting no action was taken.
