The total stocks of wheat in Canada, at the principal points, including 3,276,000 bushels in Maritime provinces, and 2,050,000 at Lake Superior, are estimated at 5,326,000 bushels against 4,000,000 bushels a year ago.

There is a movement in Manitoba and the North-West Territories to organize Boards of Trade and early clearing associations. Several Boards have already been formed. The growth of business in the North-West in the past few years has necessitated some action and much good to general trade is expected to result from the movement.

The result of the degradation of a Corporal in "A" Battery, Kingston, to the rank of a private for refusing to march his men to the caisson to drink beer in honor of the Queen's Birthday is worthy of consideration, for if our present military discipline prevents a member of the force leaving his post for his moral principles the quicker the former is reconverted the better.

Hon. William Mulock has decided to issue what will be known as "Ocean steam books." Each book consists of two pages of six stamps each, interspersed with text and paper, and is so convenient to carry in the pocket or pocketbook. The book is usually bound in silk covers, and in the inner sides is set forth information relating to the various steam services. The book will sell for 25 cents.

The advance of six or seven cents a bushel in the price of wheat in the West the past week has been very encouraging to the farmers and others who have been holding the grain for many months for a rise. The wheat market had been in a rut for an unusually long time, and the price had begun to sag before the term came. Those who had the courage of their convictions in regard to higher values, and who did not sell, have secured handsome profits.

The prohibition bill of Prince Edward Island was probably the chief measure passed at the session just closed, in presenting which the Premier stated that he would proceed to land or fall by it. Although the Opposition obtained considerable success, they finally voted for the bill. The smallest Province of the Dominion has thus the honor of enacting the first prohibition statute, and to Premier Macdonald great credit is due by the temperance people of the Province. The bill absolutely prohibits the retail sale except for sacraments, medical, scientific or mechanical purposes, under strict restrictions. Wholesale trade is prohibited, except to physicians and druggists, and where liquor is sold for consumption outside the Province.
