WOMEN MICROSCOPISTS.

There are some thousand women employed in the Chicago stock yards, of whom over a hundred are inspectors of meat intended for export. They are for the most part well-educated women, from twenty years of age upwards. Their work is to inspect the meat under the microscope and report to the presence or absence of trichinosis. The work is that frequent result of a few minutes' examination, and six hours of animal labor constitutes the day's work. These expert women re-examine the specimens already passed upon by other specialists. New recruits are obliged to spend four or five months studying how to detect trichinosis in the different stages. The average rate of pay is fifty dollars a month.
