Ontario Provincial Winter Fair.
The opening of the Ontario Provincial Winter Fair, including the Provincial Fat Stock and Dairy Show and the Ontario Poultry Show, to be held in the new winter fair building at Guelph from the 11th to the 14th December, has been the talk of the town since it was announced. The fair will be very important to stockmen, breeders, dairymen, and poultry raisers throughout the province. Dairy cattle will undergo trials in the best of the show, and fat stock will be killed and dressed on the premises.

A Naval Officer's Visit.
Capt. and Mrs. Kingsmill were in town with Mr. Walter Beardmore on Tuesday. Capt. Kingsmill is commander of the British warship "Mildred," and is on furlough during his wedding tour. The Captain leaves next Wednesday to join his wife at Vancouver. Mrs. Kingsmill will accompany him. The bride leaves on Thursday to join the fleet to welcome the Royal warships at Melbourne, and it will probably be several years before they return again to Canada. Mrs. Kingsmill, nee Miss Constance Beardmore, was for a number of years a resident of Acton where her father, Mr. Walter Beardmore, had his out of town residence here.

The Room at the South.
Mr. John Hymon, who is spending a week or so with his mother at Ottawa, has returned to his home in the description of the remarkable activity and growth of South St. Marie, where his firm settled in business last March. The population is now 6,000, and with the immense pulp mills, sulphite works, railway construction, the shipping through the splendid canal, and the building operations in progress, it is certainly a stirring place. The wages bill of the great Chlorine works at the South and contributive to it is about \$70,000 a week. All the Acton people who went up there are doing well and Messrs. Hymon and Campbell are building up a business very satisfactory to themselves.

A Well Deserved Promotion.
While citizens generally will be pleased to hear of the promotion of Mr. John Milbourn from the position of ticket agent at the G. T. H. station here, to that of agent at Millerton on the Waterloo, Owen Sound and Stratford branch of the G. T. H. all regret the removal of him from Mrs. Milbourn's Acton. CHAND VALLEY FIRE-BURNED.
The Postoffice and the Star Printing Office Among the Places Burned.

A very disastrous fire occurred at Grand Valley early Saturday morning, when the following buildings were totally destroyed: J. H. Vespele, Jewellery; T. McLaughlin, baker and grocer; postoffice; Star Printing Office; H. H. Hopkins, drugstore and general tailors; J. H. Baker, butcher; J. F. Newbury, grocer. All the buildings are a total loss. The fire is supposed to have started in McLaughlin's bakery. Mr. McLaughlin and family lived over the store, and barely escaped in their night clothes. The amount of insurance is not known. The insurance companies will not have to pay.

A mother's house at Egg Lake East was burned down Saturday afternoon when in the building were killed.

Eight, the youth who attempted to assassinate the Prince of Wales at Brussels and afterwards escaped to Paris, has been arrested. He is handed over to the Belgian authorities.
