Moved by Dr. McElroy, seconded by H. J. Matthews, that the Secretary be instructed to advertise for tenders for twenty-five yards of green maple and ten yards beech, all to be good solid wood body wool, four feet long, to be delivered at the school by the first of March. Tenders will be received up to the 15th of January.

Moved by J. H. Matthews, seconded by W. H. Kenney, that John Cameron be re-elected a representative of the Board on the Free Library Board for the ensuing three years.

Moved by Dr. McElroy, seconded by W. H. Kenney, that the account of J. H. Pearson, Nov. 27 for supplies to be received and the Treasurer be instructed to pay the same—Carried.

Moved by G. A. McElroy, seconded by W. H. Kenney, that the sum of one more thousand be added to the Secretary-Treasurer for the year 1901, and that J. H. Matthews, the manager and treasurer be committee to report at next meeting as to Secretary-Treasurer.

Mr. McElroy said several reporters had spoken to him expressing the opinion that the salary paid by pane boards had been too high. He thought so himself and had spoken to three persons whom he could secure, either of whom would perform the duties of the office to the satisfaction of the tanners.
