Moved by H. Swackhamer, seconded by J. J. Lawton, that H. Moore be re-elected a member of the Executive Board, for the ensuing three years, as representative of the brigade.—Carried.

The question of the legality of the Transient Traders' By-law, at present in force, was spoken of in view of the fact that what last put into effect the County Judge questioned its legality.

The members of the council thought the by-law was unconstitutional.
