The budget debate in the legislature, which has been one of the longest on record, was concluded shortly before midnight last Wednesday, when a vote was taken, the government being sustained by a majority of ten. This is the first division of the session and shows an increased majority since last session.

The trade of the country has increased one hundred and twenty-three millions of dollars in the past three years and only one hundred and twenty-six millions in the previous three years. This rate of growth cannot, of course, be expected to continue, but the volume of trade can hardly recede, no matter what happens.—Toronto Star.
