EDITORIAL NOTES.

The local situation in Ontario is as disconcerting as ever. Holders of the last crop are still asking previous prices and appear to think that the market is in a position to pay the price when there is no demand for export.

The Minister of Finance has given notice of a resolution to authorize the annual payment of \$100,000 to be drawn from the fund established for the relief of the poor of the Province of Ontario.

The people of Acton are seriously considering the question of a local council. A deputation of local farmers has made a strong appeal for the introduction of the Acton Act.

At a meeting of the British Empire League at Ottawa last week it was disclosed that the Colonial Office has been in correspondence with the Government of Ontario regarding the introduction of the Acton Act.

Acton citizens are urging the Council to pass a Curfew by-law. We have such a by-law in Georgetown and it worked well as long as it was enforced.

Germany is taking an interest in the sugar beet experiment in Ontario. Deputy Minister C. G. James has received several letters from German manufacturers who are evidently afraid of losing the Canadian market.

At the last meeting of the Acton village council, a deputation waited upon them and asked that a curfew by-law be introduced and passed by the council.

The census returns for the county of Halton were all returned to commissioners Dewar at Milton last week. The census report is expected to be ready in a few days.

Business conditions through the country are very encouraging. The recent rains have greatly improved the state of trade, and retailers are inclined to continue making preparations for a big season's business.

The replies of the councils of Milton and Acton regarding the operation of the Curfew by-law have favorably impressed several members of the council.

Those who take an interest in local municipal matters will receive the following information regarding the state of the Curfew by-law in various other towns this year.

The resolution passed in Council Monday evening favoring the construction of permanent pavements from Frederick Street to the G. T. H. crossing on Mill Street, will be very generally favored by our citizens.
