Nominations at Milton to-day.

Monday next will be Acton's Victoria Day.

General improvements are in progress to many of the houses and surroundings in town.

The executive of the Ontario League Day Alliance meets in Toronto on Friday, 30th May.

The splendid show and want weather have wonderfully advanced vegetation the past week.

The annual convention of the Ontario Farmers' Institute at the Hamilton Agricultural College, Guelph, will be held this year on Saturday, 21st June.

The half mile course of the park has been rebuilt and improved; the past week, and will now afford considerable satisfaction to horsemen and cyclists.

The treasurer of the Free Library Board received on Monday from the Treasury Department of the Government a cheque for \$187, the Government grant to the library for 1901.

Acton is likely to have a gala day on Coronation Day. The horsemen will likely be here in considerable numbers and the Coronation Day events at the Public School will be of memorable interest.

Deaths of Mr. Palmer Isom.
The Press Printer in receipt of a letter from Mrs. M. A. Mann, giving particulars of the death of Mr. W. Palmer Isom, at his home 112 East Jackson Street, Battle Creek, Mich., on Tuesday, 19th inst. The trouble was locomotor ataxia. Mr. Isom was a native of Acton, and his 55th birthday would have been reached on Monday, 10th May. He was laid at rest in Oakhill Cemetery on Thursday last, the A. O. U. W., of which he was a prominent member, officiating.

Dr. Gray's Bone & Marrow.
Since the battle of Hart's River, South Africa, the bones of Dr. Thomas Gray, Frederick Street, has been found with some of the bones from their son Claude, whose company the family felt certain was in the engagement. The Dr. has received two letters this week and the family has been quite reassured. Private Gray was thought to be killed in the fight and escaped without a wound though a bursting shell tore away the crown of his hat—a close shave indeed.

Victoria Day Baseball Match.
The Victoria Day of the Acton Baseball Club is anxious to provide this season a series of superior games of baseball for the pleasure of citizens who enjoy this sport. To this end they have engaged the Queen City of Toronto, for a match hereon Saturday—Victoria Day. The Queen City are champions of Toronto City League and Acton are champions of Halton. A keen, well played contest may therefore be looked for. Games will be called every 100. Acton Cornet Band will be in attendance.

Considerable Awakening.
The evangelistic services in Knox Church conducted by Messrs. Bethune and Whyte were concluded on Sunday, May 18th. Interest in the meetings continued to the end, and the tone of the meetings was good. Nothing was done to vitiate the finest feelings. Considerable awakening has resulted; and if indeed of a few weeks' service the meetings were continued for at least four, there is no doubt that a very general interest in religious matters would have prevailed in the community.

Mr. Barber's Acton Meeting.
Pastors have been issued announcing a mass meeting of electors in the town hall on Friday evening, 22nd inst., in the interest of Mr. John H. Barber, the Liberal Candidate. Mr. Barber will address the electors and will be ably supported by Hon. E. J. Davis, Commissioner of Crown Lands, whose splendid addresses throughout the province have been so well received everywhere. T. G. Robinson, Esq., the well-known Toronto barrister, is also billed to speak. He is a clear, incisive and eloquent speaker and will not fail to impress the audience. The meeting commences at eight o'clock.

He Will be a Big Politician.
Mr. Joseph Boyd, who made application last winter for a place on Toronto Public Force, was called to the city last week to undergo his entrance examination. He was successful, and in a squad of fifty applicants stood seventh in point of merit, and will enter upon his duties about the middle of June. Joe is a young man of splendid physique, of good judgment and manly in all things. We are sorry to lose him from town but confident he will make his mark in his new sphere. Mr. Boyd's father, the late Henry Boyd, was accepted for a position on the same force, but died before he was called to duty.

A Former Esteemed Citizen's Death.
Thirty years ago one of the most prominent citizens of Acton was Wm. Firstbrook, who was in business here as farmer, merchant and lumberman. Mr. Firstbrook moved with his family to Toronto about a quarter century ago, where he very successfully conducted a banking and lumbering business. Firstbrook's business was established upon the death of his wife a number of years ago. Mr. Firstbrook returned to his boyhood's home at Massey, England, and was subsequently re-married. He has several times since visited Canada and usually spent a few days in Acton during these visits. About the 28th April last, he and Mrs. Firstbrook left England for Canada arriving in Toronto on the first of May. He was taken seriously ill and died last Friday morning, being in his seventy-seventh year. The remains were interred at Toronto. Mrs. James Firstbrook, Mr. W. A. Storey, Mr. John Warren and Dr. A. C. Warren went down to attend the funeral on Saturday.

Another Victory for Acton.
The Acton Baseball Team journeyed to Hillsburg on Saturday and played a game with the local nine there winning by a score of 18 to 3. The score did not indicate the strength of the respective teams. The faithful old favorite will, however, continue to make his headquarters here during the season.

Coronation Day at the Public School.
The suggestion of the Free Press relative to the procuring of a new flag and flagstaff for the Public School is very likely to be carried into successful effect. Dr. McKean and Mr. H. P. Moore had a conference last Friday afternoon with the teachers at the Public School and their approval has been given to the matter.
