NEW STEAMER SERVICE

William Peterson and Co., Limited, the well-known shipping firm of Newcastle-on-Tyne, have opened offices in Toronto in the McKinnon Building, Melinda Street. This is the initial step in the establishing of a line of freight steamers on the Great Lakes of Canada, including which have already been made. Captain Thos. Donnelly, the well-known marine man, of Kingston, has been appointed chief superintendent of the new concern and has arrived in the city to take immediate charge of affairs. The new line will be in operation by the middle of September, in time to carry a goodly portion of this year's immense crop. To start with, four first-class steamers will be put on the route from Port Arthur and Port Arthur to Georgian Bay ports. The names of the steamers are: Turret Cape, Turret Court, Turret Crown and Turret Chief. They have each a capacity for 100,000 bushels of wheat and have a draught of 17 feet 6 inches. Three of the steamers are now in the St. Lawrence on route to Toronto, and the fourth will leave England in a few days.
