NEWS OF LOCAL IMPORT.

Malton Farmers' Association.
A meeting of the farmers of Malton will be held in the town hall, Milton, at one o'clock tomorrow, (Friday) to organize a branch for Malton of the more 19 farmers' association recently formed in Toronto. This is an important organization and is calculated to advance the interests of the farmers of the country on lines similar to those adopted by the manufacturers and put into effect by the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.

Sudden Death of Neil McArthur.
Death came very suddenly last Friday evening to Mr. Neil McArthur of lot 4, east 1, Erin Road, who had been a member of the Sunday school congregation of the First Presbyterian Church in Guelph. Early in the week he was taken ill and his physician pronounced his ailment typhoid fever. He rapidly sank and death came on Friday. The remains were interred in Edgewood Cemetery, Acton, on Monday afternoon, Rev. H. A. Macpherson officiating.

The Council in a whi admitted that the position was a hardship upon those concerned and there was a tacit understanding that steps would be taken when the matter would be remedied. The Court was adjourned and the members met at a Council.

Moved by John Henderman, seconded by George Hynd, that leave be granted to introduce a by-law making a special assessment on the property of certain council and local improvement districts as well as on improvements to be made for the basic and sale of property to pay for same and that it be now read a first time.

The by-law was read a first time. The Council then adjourned.

Meeting at Speyville.

A meeting of the electors of Speyville and surrounding country will be held in the hall there next Tuesday joint and part of the first floor of the right hand.
