An Actor Doy Scown Good Deal of the World, Has Some Interesting Expertenoss, and Comes Home, with the Utmast Paith in Mis Own Town and Country.

Lynd, son of Mr. Wm Lynd, Esq., Main St., returned o Saturday, 11th inst, from an extensive trip of a couple of years' duration, during which time he visited South Africa, Australia, New Zonland, Eng land, and other points. When been by a Fack Passe reporter during the week he told the story of his trip and gave an account of several intersuling experiences.

> In December they had a chance to see some more of the country and incidentally to learn a little of African savages. They were ordered to Swaziland, along with ten others of the troop, to support the forces in that district, who were guarding

against native uprisings. Joe tells an interesting story of how he spent last Christman. He ate his Christmus dinner, which, by the way consisted of bully beef and hard tack on the banks of the Assigeyl river i Swaziland. In this district, he says. the natives wear next to no clothing, which were much enjoyed by the large live on maize and mealies and are very rough and disagreeable lo This life did not suit the boys so they asked for their discharge, which wa granted on the 6th of February of the present year. They then returned to the coast to Durban intending to sail for home. There Billy Parnell was taken ill and had rather a serious time

with fever. He had not altogether

recovered when Joe left him. Joe shipped as seamen on a steamer at Durban, and went from there to Australia where they touched at Allmny and stayed a week at Sydney. He is not much taken with Australia, and says the country is too dry and the life too rough to suit him. From Bydney the steamer went to New Zealand, calling at Auckland and six other ports, spending a week there altogether. Here he was able to get some idea of the country and tells of the farms, the mines, and other industries of the country. They left New Zealand on the 20th of April for London, and wore on the water six weaks without landing, coming from Now Zealand, to Los Palmas in the Canary Islands, by way of Cape Horn.

From the Canaries they were another week reaching London. Joe has fallen quite in in love with the sailor's life. Although his life provious to his departure for South Africa has been spent on a farm, he seems to take to a scafaring life very readily, and though he travelled sever al thousands of miles, and experienced some very rough weather, says he never once suffered from seasickness. The life, although somewhat rough, suits him perfectly, and he enjoyed immensely-the weeks spont-as a conman. In fact he is at present quite

inclined to start out again to see some more of the world in the same way. From London, Joe went with his steamer to Liverpool, where he spent a week and a half in the city with other sallors. He then shipped for Quebec on one of the Domision dine steamors, spent a day or so in that city and at Montreal, and reached home Saturday evening, 11th inst. after an absence of almost two years

Joe says he is glad to get home, and puts Canada, "Gods Own Country," and his own little town of Acton, ahead of any other place he has seen.


