**The Fireman's Fourth Assembly.**  
The fourth annual ball and supper of Acton Fire Brigade will be held on Friday evening, 27th inst. Wellwood's Orchestra, of Toronto, will provide music. The food supper will be served at the Clark House.  
**Another Fine Concert Coming.**  
The members of the Epworth League have engaged Mr. and Mrs. Rowell and their company, of Bradford, to give one of their unique and very interesting entertainments in the Methodist Church on Tuesday evening, 8th December. This company enjoys a very high reputation as entertainers.  
**A Doctor's Director's Great Success.**  
Mr. H. J. Kerr, of the Maple Hunt House at Minerva, writes the *Free Press* that he has just been consulting the full exhibition with his horse of pure bred Yorkshire and Berkshire pedigrees. He won 100 prizes out of 112 entries—97 firsts, 10 seconds and 2 thirds. This result is certainly very flattering to Mr. Kerr's ability as a breeder.  
**Death of Mr. Thos. E. Vanberg.**  
Mr. John Kennedy, Jr., was called to St. Mary's last Thursday evening owing to the critical illness of his father, Mr. Thos. E. Vanberg. Mr. Vanberg was taken ill on Monday, and on Thursday the physicians decided on an operation for appendicitis. He died on Friday morning. Mrs. Vanberg was at the bedside of her father at Norwood, who was lying at the point of death. Mr. and Mrs. Vanberg were frequent visitors in Acton.  
**From Coats and Walks Not Complete.**

**An Interesting Documentary Note.**  
Mr. R. J. McNabb, Division Clerk, received the other day from Mr. J. Shaw, Inspector Merchants' Bank, Montreal, a document of interest from recent Canadian Parliamentary days. It is an original certificate from Sir Allan W. McNabb, Speaker in the Legislative Assembly of Canada, dated Montreal, 26th June, 1886, authorizing the Treasurer of the Assembly to give George Meade, then representative of the constituency of East York \$100 for special allowance and \$18.10 for mileage, in attending the session of the year. Mr. McNabb prizes the relic for its rarity as well as for the fact the Speaker of the time assembly and himself are members of the same clan of McNabb.
