MANY NOMINATIONS BUT ACTON HAS NO COUNCIL.

Four Candidates Nominated for the Revoehship; Seven for Council—How and What for.

SWACKHAMER FOR REVEE, AND HYNDY ONLY FOR COUNCIL.

The nomination of candidates for the municipal Council and Board of Education for 1922, at noon on Monday, brought out the usual quota of interested electors. The hour was very quickly spent, all the nominations being put in writing as required by recent statutory enactment. When the town hall rang at one o'clock, the hour for receiving nominations having expired, Municipal Clerk Moore read the names of the candidates as follows:

At the close of the nomination Mr. John Cameron, J. P., was moved to the chair. The members of the present year's Council were first called to give an account of their stewardship. Reeve Swackhamer was therefore the first speaker. He said the business of the present year had gone forward in a very satisfactory manner. It was customary for the Reeve to serve a two-year term, and he felt that with his experience of past years he could not do better service as Reeve in 1922. The present financial statement, up to the 15th December, had been distributed, he would, therefore, not require to deal with finances. The standing of the Corporation had, he said, been considerably improved during the year. Reference was made to the increased area of permanent walks; to the street extensions of the electric lights and other matters. He regretted that the road work of several of the streets had not been completed, and also that the Council was powerless to assume one-half the cost of the permanent pavements and to equalize the special assessments on corner lot pavements, as they desired to do. The clearing of the streets from the sidewalk was a vexed question. He was working up a scheme for letting of the contract for this work to one man and have the town pay for it as it should. In all his time of service in behalf of the Corporation he had taken a large interest in the affairs of the town. He may not possess the grace and dignity of some, but was willing to leave himself in the electors' hands. Councillor Hynds, the Chairman of the Committee on Finance and on the Electric Lighting works, would next be called on to give an account of his stewardship. He said that the Council was powerless to assume one-half the cost of the permanent pavements and to equalize the special assessments on corner lot pavements, as they desired to do. shaking fund, we have a surplus of a little over \$100 on the year's operations. He had, himself, given very careful supervision to all the business of the powerhouses, but he felt that a large share of credit for the results shown was due to the efforts of Mr. Carruthers, the very capable engineer and electrician. Whoever is the chairman of this committee in the future should be a man who could give careful supervision to all purchases and operations. Reference was further made to the purchase by the Corporation of the \$1000 of permanent pavement delinquent, thus resulting four per cent. interest instead of the usual three per cent. bank interest. Our finances are in first-class condition, he said; we retire with clear consciences and clean hands. With reference to the nomination for the Revoehship, I think my friends who proposed my name and will give the matter due consideration before finally deciding, I had already given fourteen years to the School Board and Council. Councillor Holmes gave a detailed report of the work of the Committee on Streets and Walks, of which he is chairman. The printed report and addresses of preceding speakers left the auditor for the Revoehship. He referred to the economical expenditure of his committee; of the improved crossings they had made by utilizing the flagging taken from the places where permanent crossings were laid and promptly showed that the appropriation was not over-run, but showed a balance. The committee could have spent more money, but considered it better to be economical. He had not fully decided as to acceptance of the nomination for the Revoehship. His health is not very good and he had already given twelve years to public duties for the town. Councillor Brown felt that nothing was left for him to say further than that the year's business was very agreeably transacted. Councillor Jeans was not set when called upon. Dr. McKeague spoke for the Board of Education. He said there was a feeling among a few that the High School Department was costing the town too much. He thought this was a misapprehension and made explanations showing that with the grants from the Legislature and the County Council the department was costing but \$220 per annum. He had the people think the children from the laboring man's home should have educational advantages equal to those of the well-to-do citizen. We have now a school where the extra cost of one mill on the dollar gives all children of the town the opportunity to pass examinations that will give them second class certificates. Acton is progressive and is going ahead, and this is one of the ways of keeping it going progressively. Though I am removing from Acton, I will always retain my interest in educational matters here. In choosing your trustees for 1921 I would recommend that in all cases men with children be selected as they naturally have a greater interest in providing school advantages. Trustees Coleman and Johnston also spoke briefly expressing the interest they felt in the education of the children of the community.
