(3) If the settler has his permanent residence open ferming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. His mouths' notice in writing should be piven to the Commissioner, of Dominion Lands at Ottaws of intention to apply for patchi.
