DOCTOR DIED ON DUTY. Welland Physician Called Almost Without Moment's Warning. Welland, Ont., June 5.—Dr. J. M. Kokeney, coroner, one of the oldest and best known practitioners in Welland County, died suddenly of heart failure yesterday. He had been in Toronto last day before, and went out to the barn to see his horse. Not returning, a search was made, and he was found lying dead.

He was seventy years of age, was born in the county, a member of one of the first families, and had been in practice in Welland since 1865, for part of the time in partnership with Hon. W. H. Montague. For many years he was a member of the Board of Examiners of the Ontario Medical College. He leaves two daughters, Mrs. Elliott, wife of W. J. Elliott, of Toronto, barrister, and Miss Stait, at home, and an adopted son, Roy D. Schooley, of Pittsburg. Mrs. Schooley died on May 21.

A., has a speedy and tricky bunch of players who without any team practice on Monday easily defeated the famous Heaverton Checkers with a score of 13-3.

Improving Plant and Machinery. The owners of the, who are continually making improvements to keep their plant and machinery up to the requirements of their business are at present making considerable change in their power transmitting plant in the Acton Cement Works' factory. In installing machinery in the immense new building the individual electric motor system, the most modern system of power transmission, is being used and hereafter each department of the works will be operated by its own motor. This will do away with the thousands of feet of shafting and consequent waste of power which the old system necessitated. To operate the motors and to supply the company's private lighting system a large new dynamo of the A. T. E. type from the Canadian General Electric Company has recently been installed, this being driven from the new 350 horse power engine. In the sole leather tannery a very complete new system of conveyors has just been installed for the more economic preparation of the tanning liquors.
