EDITORIAL NOTES

Owing to the stringency in the money market in the United States capitalists are becoming apprehensive of financial trouble there. It is rumored that English and French capitalists are about to establish a trust company in Montreal with a capital of \$5,000,000. They put quite a sum in making large investments in Canada.

Municipal councils all over the province have been doing illegal acts in regard to remission of taxes. Only Courts of Revision can now rule. The Municipal World says: "The subordinate authority, the Court of Revision to remit taxes at any time during the year in which the tax was assessed or before the first of July in the following year. No such power is given to the municipalities to remit taxes. Only the Court of Revision can act legally."

It evidently pays to be methodical and careful in the preservation of receipts for bills, especially receipts for taxes. Thorold's tax collector decamped, leaving shortages in his accounts of about \$2000. Those tax payers who can furnish receipts to show they have paid their taxes the last two or three years are nothing out by the existing state of affairs. Those who do not show their receipts, having neglected to keep them from year to year, simply have to pay over again, and no amount of arguing and circumstantial evidence has any effect. Preserve your tax receipts.

The railroads of Western Canada continue to advance their lines in all directions. The Canadian Pacific Railway has just made arrangements with a Winnipeg contractor for an extension of the line running northwest from Moose Jaw to Lacombe and Edmonton. Such move on the part of this great railroad should tend to convince people who have doubted regarding the immediate future before this part of the country.

A glance at the general revenue for the first quarter of the current fiscal year ending July 30, will disclose a remarkable condition of affairs. The total revenue for the past four months amounts to \$32,391,888; during the same period the total expenditure has been \$17,101,621 on consolidated fund account and \$1,501,611 on capital account. For the past four months of the current fiscal year the surplus of ordinary revenue over ordinary expenditure is \$19,100,222. In short, the affairs of the Dominion have been conducted upon such a sound basis that there is a visible surplus of \$10,100,222 in four months.

Deceased was born in Ireland 72 years ago. He came to Canada with his parents sixty years ago and settled in Niagara-on-the-Lake.

With other early settlers he went into the new country and by enduring hardships and by persevering efforts of the pioneer he won for himself a home which well deserved him.

It is some four years since his wife died. Five daughters and three sons still survive. The five daughters are: Mrs. Hill, New York State; Jane and Emily, at home, and Kate and Dan at Guelph. The three sons—Wm., in the old homestead; Walter in Michigan, and a fourth member of the family, Rev. Dr. Joseph McGlaughlin, the deacon of the Wesleyan Church the deceased over commanded the high esteem and respect of all who met him, and was much beloved by all who were favored with a more intimate friendship.
