

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

A NY even numbered section of Dominion A Lands in Manitohs, Haskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 6 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 150 scree, more or less.
