MERRY, MERRY CHRISTMAS.

The Free Press must cordially wish every reader the most joyous and happy Christmas possible. Christmas stands not only for love but for faith—in all-conquering faith, that looks beyond the material and winds up the year with the spiritual. Thanksgiving has summed up the season of planting and reaping; Christmas goes far above the physical life, and bids us understand that we are something more than creatures who eat and drink. The grand idea that is here celebrated is self-sacrifice; and, no matter what our creed may be, we shall agree that the loftiest conception of humanity is to yield self-seeking for the good of the whole. For nineteen hundred years Christmas has spoken in terms of tendered love. Ye are not only children of the earth, but children of heaven—members of that divine family that everywhere lifts hands and voices: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." Christmas has found its place as a part of civilization—the most beautiful of all institutions. It speaks by time and custom, by sign and suggestive emblem, by laden tree and inextinguishable gifts of the omnipresent Christ spirit. It delivers by Jesus, G. W. Barker, Acton, and Black, Toronto, and B. A. G. Whiloughby, the pastor. Music was contributed by Georgetown Congregational Choir. Their choruses, solo, duets, and quartettes were all most creditable. Rev. Mr. Whiloughby gave two recitations. The choir was composed as usual by H. P. Moore.

CHURCHILL.

A case of smallpox has developed in the home of Mrs. John Snyder. Her brother, Robert Stauffer, a stone mason, arrived there from Hamilton a couple of weeks ago. He was taken ill and Dr. Hamilton, of Kryn, was called in and had suspicion that it was a case of smallpox. The provincial health authorities were communicated with, and Dr. Bell, came up from Toronto to investigate. He pronounced the case smallpox. The premises were at once placed in charge of the Township Board of Health and quarantined. It is hoped the disease will be confined to the one case.

COLLEGE RE-OPENS.

The Central Business College of Toronto will re-open for the registration and reception of new students for the winter term on January 2nd. This school employs a staff of twenty-four regular teachers with several extra assistants during the winter months when the attendance is largest. The courses given are modern and the results produced are well shown in the success and satisfaction enjoyed by the graduates of this excellent institution. The new catalogue just from the press is an excellent one and explains in detail the systematic work of all departments of this great school.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

A number of County Councils will co-operate with that of Halton in petitioning the Government of Ontario to reduce the amount of grants for road work to at least one-half of the expenditure on county systems. Dr. Buck, Reeve of Trafalgar, was the originator of the proposition. If the matter obtains the approval of the Government it will be a fitting climax to Dr. Buck's forty years in municipal activity in this county.

IMMIGRATION IN CANADA THIS YEAR.

Immigration in Canada this year will total about 238,000 persons, a gain of about thirty per cent. compared with the number of arrivals of the previous year. The number of immigrants from Great Britain showed an increase of fifty per cent. which may be taken to show that the quality of immigration has improved during the past year. In 1907 the United States added 1.6 per cent. of the population, while the addition to the population has reached 4.8 per cent.

THE NEW IMMIGRATION POLICY OF THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT TO RESTRICT BRITISH AND CONTINENTAL IMMIGRATION DURING THE WINTER MONTHS.

The new immigration policy of the Federal Government to restrict British and Continental immigration during the winter months is not only in violation of the open system by Canadian steamship lines. Over a hundred able-bodied men have been deported from the port of Halifax because they had not the requisite sum of \$50 in their pockets, or because they had not secured visas before leaving England. The complaint of the shipping men is that they were not notified of the changed conditions in time to modify their offices on the other side.

IN A LARGE NUMBER OF MUNICIPALITIES OF ONTARIO LOCAL OPTION HAS BEEN IN FORCE FOR AT LEAST EIGHTEEN MONTHS.

It is possible now to gauge the results of their experience. Among the advantages gained was the abolition of the treating system, which is admitted to be a good thing even by many who are still opposed to local option; less disorderly conduct about the hotels and restaurants; more cleanliness and better behavior about the hotels, and therefore more pleasure and satisfaction to the travelling public requiring to use them; money saved by the workmen and in some cases their families; better and more efficient service to employers, who find their men steadier at their work.—Toronto News.
