It is predicted that the immigration from the United States during the coming season will be very heavy and likely to much surpass the total of last year. This American iminigration is generally of a most desirable class. The people are generally well supplied with money, and they stimulate business in the districts in which they locate.

Respecting the present floancial outlook, Bradstreets, of New York, says It would be impossible, even if dosirable, to close one's eyes to the fact that a great change making for cheerfulness and confidence bus come over the general situation, and especially the financial position, since the dark days of late November and early December. Signs of this change have been, perhaps, slow in making their appearance, and their gradual approach in itself has sometimes prevented a correct appraisament of the imbortunge due each happening, but it le boyand question that a lessening of the financial tension has occurred in the past month and especially since the turn of the year. The first week of January saw call money easy, time money once more re appeared in the market, and stocks begin to advance.

Returns for the first full year of the Municipal Electric Lighting Plant under the metre system are new available and two important facts are de monstrated. First, the revenues of deflet in last year's finances and anthe year are the largest in the history of the plant, and second, the overload on the engine and dynamo-so frequently talked about under the flat rate system-was never felt this year. so the electrician declares, even during the month of December when the de mands are greater and more continu ous than in any other month. 

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS. A NY even numbered scotten of Dominton Laude in Manitoba, Backstchewen and Alberta, excepting 8 and 16, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of head of a family, or any male over 18 years of head of a family.

The homesteader is required to perform the (1) At least six months' residence upon and pultivation of the land in each year for three (2) A hamostoxiler mar, it he so desires, per-

form the required residence duties by litting on farming land owned so ely by him, not less han eighty (40) acres to extent, in the vicinty of its homestoad. Joint ownership in faud, will (3) . If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a humest-ader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acros in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homestewler may perform his own residence duties

by living with the father (or mother). (i) The term "vicinity" in the two preceeding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the (5) A homosteader intending to perform his residence duties in assertance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.


