Private Mole, the murderer at the London Barracks, who was supposed to be hiding in Nasagawaya last week, was captured of a farm between Elora and Arthur on Saturday. He had been working for a farmer for ten days. Two constables of Arthur got the \$400 reward offered by the government.

They will spend the summer in England and Scotland visiting relatives on both sides of the house. Mrs. Wilson's mother has been in poor health all winter and she is very anxious to see her. They will return in September.

The Fourth Quarterly Communion.
The last quarterly communion service of the Methodist Church for the present Conference year, was held in the Methodist Church last Sunday and was an occasion of special interest. There were large congregations, and the number of communicants was greater than usual. At the reception service in the morning the right hand of fellowship was extended to thirteen new members. Pastor's sermon was highly appropriate to the day's services.

The Chopping Mill.
Councillors Dr. Gray and Alex. Hall, and Messrs. John Harvey and H. P. Moore, the committee appointed to report on the proposed chopping mill, conferred with Messrs. Boardman & Co. relative to the re-opening of the mill, had an interview with Mr. A. O. Boardman last Thursday. Mr. Boardman expressed himself quite ready to lease the mill property, and that the firm will gladly lease the property to a responsible tenant. They had found it disadvantageous to operate the mill themselves. The firm is now advertising for a tenant and it is hoped that a good tenant will soon be in possession.

A call to Mrs. Wm. Wilson.
Rev. A. C. Wilson, M. A., of London, preached in the Baptist Church here on Sunday afternoon with great acceptance. So well pleased were the members of the congregation with his ministrations that they met after the service and unanimously decided to extend a call to be their pastor. The Georgetown congregation also took similar action. Rev. Mr. Wilson was for some two years assistant to the pastor of the Baptist Church, at Dayton, Ohio. He has been in London the past year. During the absence of Rev. Prof. Farmer in Europe two years ago Rev. Mr. Wilson occupied the professor's chair at the University of London. He is a man of high character and of high attainments. The call has been presented but Rev. Mr. Wilson has not yet given his decision in the matter.

Committed to Industrial School.
Last Thursday Arthur Watson, familiarly known as "Pat," came before the Board of Juvenile Delinquents on the charge of wilfully damaging the property of Ronald Sinclair, wagon maker, Agnes Street, by smashing windows in his paint shop a week previous. The charge was proven, and the father of the lad admitted in evidence that the boy was disobedient, destructive, cruel to animals and entirely beyond his control. Constable Garrahan testified that numerous citizens had complained to him concerning the conduct of the lad and that he had frequently to caution him. The magistrate corresponded with the authorities relative to his admission to the Victoria Industrial School at Mimico, and to this institution he was committed on Monday morning. Chief Leaman conveyed the lad to the school. He will be under official restraint there and will have an opportunity of learning some useful trade.

Peacefully at Rest.
Death came to the home of Mr. Thos. Best while the mother quietly rested away last Friday morning. For the past three years she has been in ill health, and has been confined to her bed for about nine months. With all her sufferings she manifested Christian fortitude and her constant prayer night prior to her death was "Come Jesus and take me home." She was interested in every good work and always ready to lend a helping hand. She loved the House of God and his cause was her continual delight. She was for many years a member of the Biltmore Methodist Church. The funeral on Sunday afternoon was largely attended. A most impressive service was conducted by Rev. G. W. Barker. The text was John 14: 19 verse. "Peace I leave with you, My peace I give, unto you, not as the world giveth, give I unto you, let not your heart be troubled neither let it be afraid." The favorite hymns of the deceased were sung at the funeral. She was a loving mother and most devoted to her family, for whom deepest sympathy is expressed. The remains were tenderly laid to rest at Fairview Cemetery. Her husband, two sons and four daughters survive.

Mr. Jas. H. Anderson vs. G. T. N.
Mr. James H. Anderson has at last succeeded in securing a settlement with the Grand Trunk Railway for injuries sustained in the Guelph week a year ago last spring. A very liberal settlement was made and the Montreal surgeon's bill was paid. Mr. Anderson has improved in health considerably lately.

Lights Out—Monday Night.
On Monday night the haller at the power house was being blown out and cleaned for testing. There was consequently no electric current available for either street or private lighting. The reason for the lack of light is quite defensible, but it is surely due to the setting of the lighting system that notice be given when lights are to be cut off.

First Home Game Ball Match.

Brown, have commenced the erection of a brick-veneered house on St. Louis street, on their property on Mill Street. It will be a square house with veranda and balcony and will be a homelike and attractive edifice. The old house has been vacated and will be at once torn down.

The 20th Regiment at Quebec.
Capt. Gamble, of No. 6 Company, Acton, has received instructions from W. P. Moore, the commanding officer of the 20th Regt. that the regiment is ordered to Quebec to take part in the Centenary Celebration there in July. About fifty per cent. of the regiment will go. Capt. Gamble will take about 20 officers and men from Acton. These must all be bona fide Halton men, and instructions are very definite that no undesirable men are to be enlisted under any condition. The unit will give the men a splendid outing and afford an opportunity of participating in one of the most spectacular and important demonstrations of the kind in history.
