EDITORIAL NOTES

An earnest campaign against Sunday liquor selling is being carried on in Montreal by the Liquor League (Confederation). On a recent Sunday the private detectives found seven saloons keeping open liquor, and next day they all pleaded guilty. To our horizon they found sixty men and four bartenders serving them.

Great Britain's newest evidence, the Indianapolis, in big type, has beaten all records, "ranking twenty-eight known in a measured mile on the Clyde and twenty-six one-quarter knots in the continuous sounding trial. This is the war ship that will convey the Prince of Wales and suite to the centenary celebration, at Quebec in July.

While crop reports from the West are exceedingly bright, those of Ontario conditions are slightly less so. The provincial Department of Agriculture has issued a statement which is, on the whole, decidedly favorable. The crops are at present about two weeks ahead of last year, and are growing well. Fall wheat came through the winter without much damage and recent rains have done much for pastures and the hay crop.

Coldwater is an enterprising village in the County of Brant, which last January adopted Local Option. A Coldwater man—they're all coldwater men now—writing to a friend in Toronto last week, says: "Our hotels are doing business—only bars closed. No drunken men now. Saturday nights no loafers at hotel doors—no profane language heard—no filthy streets with tobacco and no drunken men going home under the neon sign."—Pioneer.

Now that it is known everywhere that in the recent furor over the enforcement of the Local Day Act, in Winnipeg, that all the Alliance asked for was the impartial and reasonable enforcement of the law, and that the Alliance did not give information nor complain in one single case, the people are placing the responsibility for the fake cases where it rightly belongs. And now, when the reasonableness of the law has been demonstrated, it is looked upon by the people as an admirable law.

It is quite evident that some hotelmen have no intention of observing the provisions of the Liquor License Act, unless their licensees are granted. Rev. Mr. Wilson stated from the pulpit on a recent Sunday, that gambling and drinking were both permitted in one of our local hotels on a recent Sunday. It is reported that this Sunday was the first after the meeting of the License Commissioners here last month, when they advised the hotelmen, after withholding their licenses for a month, that unless they "kept hotel" their licenses would be canceled. Last Sunday a visit of inquiry by Mr. Tracy proved that another hotel permitted its bar to be frequented on Sunday, and four men were found there. Verily, if the people of this good town rise up and unitedly determine to introduce Local Option and banish the bar, who will be responsible? It is certainly time for a change.

The election contest is going forward in this county quietly and with commendable good nature. Mr. R. D. Warren, the Liberal candidate, held his Action meeting last Thursday evening. Mr. Warren was the first speaker and his clear, business-like handling of the leading questions of the day created very favorable impression, showing his ability to answer the numerous public questions and his solid qualifications for the fulfillment of the duties pertaining to membership in the Legislature. Mr. Warren acquitted himself with marked credit and his friends in this section were quite proud of him. He was well in his criticism but strong in his declarations for good clean government in the best interests of the people of the Province. He was supported in a vigorous speech by Mr. H. Mowat, K. Mr. Mowat tonished upon many live questions at present at issue and showed the untenable position of Mr. Whitton's government in numerous positions taken by them. . . .
