

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST

HUMEBTEAD REQULATIONS A NY even numbered section of Dominion A Lands in Manitobs, Haskatchewan and Alberta, excepting H and Sd, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plane:-(1) At least six months' residence upon and suttivition of the land in each year for three (9) A homesteader may, if he so desires, per-form the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) sores in extent, in the vicinty of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement. (B) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming tand owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother). (4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than him miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the

(5) A homestender intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention. all months notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottaws of intention to apply for patent.
