ALLEGED COUNTERFEITERS ton Arrested at Oakville

Counterfelt bills have been put in circulation at a number of fairs the past week or two and the authorities last Saturday arrested Thes. N. Crozlier at Oakville and his son, Milton Crozler, at Milton, on the charge of circulating the counterfelt money: It is stated that the father circulated at logat thirteen of the sportous \$5.00 bills at the fair at Oakville last Friday. Nine of the bills are on an American bank and the other four on the Farmore Bank of Canada. They are poor imitations, and would immediately be detected where there was any suspleion. Some of the counterfielt money was found in young Croxler's pussession when he was taken into oustody.

The bills are \$5 and \$10 denominations, and are photo engravings, paintod by hand. The Croxiers live at 0 Gerrard St., Toronto, and a sourch on Bunday night revealed there a small printing press and photographic materials. The Uroziers are of a highly-respect-

ed family, a number of whom live between Oakville and Milton.


