THANKSGIVING

EDITORIAL NOTES
Hon. R. Baldwin-Lindsay, Postmaster-General, has gone to England with the object of negotiating for the penny-stamp rate between Canada and Great Britain.

The return of Governor Hughes with an increased salary means that the people of New York State have endorsed his anti-trace track gambling policies, and that for the next two years at least there will be no betting on the tracks in the State. Would that Canada would take as high ground on this treacherous business.

John Burns, M. P., England, the Labor leader, and President of the Local Government Board, drew down upon himself the animosity of the Laborers when he stated in the House of Commons that the cost of the war had made it necessary to employ the services of the unemployed in the factories and in the mines. Mr. Burns also suggested the suggestion that the difficulty lay in the fact that the American unemployed had money in their pockets.

TAFI ELECTED U. S. PRESIDENT

Over William Jennings Bryan by a plurality of Over a Million.
New York, Nov. 3.—William H. Taft will be the twenty-seventh President of the United States, having swept the country by a vote which will give him 253 ballots in the Electoral College against Mr. Bryan's 158, or only eleven less than Mr. Roosevelt had in 1904. His majority will be 107.
William J. Bryan, yesterday suffered his third and most crushing defeat in his twelve years' run for President of the United States.

Mr. and Mrs. Gordon's engagement was for two weeks, but whether they are able to remain longer or not the meetings will be continued by the pastor and his workers.

Since the meetings were opened services have been frequent and interesting. Each morning cottage prayer meetings have been held at the town hall of the town. Services have been held, each afternoon at three or four o'clock, and on Sunday there were special services for men in the town hall at four in the afternoon.
Last Friday afternoon Mrs. Gordon addressed a large audience of ladies in the church on "The Influence of Womanhood." This address was one of power and inspired many of those who heard it to a determination to reach a higher and better and more useful service.

There was a good attendance at the next meeting in the town hall on Sunday afternoon at four o'clock when Mrs. Gordon gave her thrilling story of "A Trip South." This was a very vivid recital of her experience when she went to a hospital in California to minister to the son of friends in Ottawa, who had become a prodigal, and through a career of drunkenness and debauchery had ruined his health and was lying at the point of death. Through her efforts he was brought to Christ. At the close of the address a number of men present signified a willingness to yield themselves to Christ. The choir of the church led the singing of this service as they have been doing at all the services.
On Friday afternoon at three o'clock, Mrs. Gordon will give another special address to women on "The Lord's Supper." All ladies in town are cordially invited to attend.
Each evening Mr. Gordon delivers an earnest address exhorting Christian people to fuller consecration and sinners to repentance.


NEWS OF THE DAY


SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.
