#### EDITORIAL NOTES

The coming session of the Provincial legislature will be asked to prohibit the sale of liquor on Christmas Day, Good Friday and Thanksgiving Day, with strong hope of the promoters of the amendment that it will be enacted.

Only three of the places which on Monday voted in the Hydro-Electric Power Bill did the people pronounced against the scheme. In all the other municipalities it was endorsed, in almost every case, by unanimous majorities. The three places which rejected it are Brantford, Thessalon and King's Mills. The latest proposition is for a line from Toronto to Guelph, to take in Brampton, Georgetown and Acton.

An indication of the outlook for the licensed year of 1893 through the W.E. for this year 1892 figures recently published by the Manitoba Government are interesting. They show the total area prepared for the crop of the coming summer to be 2,273,842 acres, which compare with the 1,710,000 acres from which the Manitoba crops of this year were taken. This striking increase in the land put to seed is largely the result of excellent weather conditions during the past three months.

Monday's campaign against the licensed bar was a great victory, Ontario is determined, both in the city and in the country, to give the bar-room its death blow. In the interest of justice and equality the fifth clause should receive its well deserved place in the near future. Although unqualified majorities were polled in a large number of places, majorities larger than originally polled in the places that have now sustained local option in repeat contests, the by-law has been defeated by the three-fifths requirement. One has only to look at the returns to be convinced that the three-fifths clause is an unqualified injustice.

Mr. B. H. Spence, Secretary of the Dominion Alliance, summarizes the result of Monday's vote on Local Option as follows: "Of repeat contests, twenty-nine had local option, while seven remained in twenty-four, in most cases by an increased majority. In two places only is local option repeated; even in these two places the result is really a victory. We have heard from forty-seven new contests. We have polled majorities in thirty-nine; the liquor men in eight. Out of the thirty-nine we were deprived of the fruits of victory in twenty—in other words, on the straight majority vote we would have been successful in thirty-nine cases, the liquor men in eight. Under the three-fifths clause the liquor men are successful in twenty-eight; we in nineteen. The argument used to support the three-fifths clause has been that it is necessary for permanency. The result certainly disproves that, for although repeat might in any of these cases have been obtained by a mere majority, there has been no repeat in any place that carried the law."

#### THE WARDENSHIP FOR ACTON

One of the most keenly contested election contests Acton has ever had in municipal matters was the election on Monday between H. Swackhamer and Dr. Gray for the Wardenship. Mr. Swackhamer's appeal for support was almost exclusively on the ground of his strong hope and expectation of securing the Wardenship of the County this year. This engendered a considerable degree of sympathy, sufficient in fact to give him a plurality of the vote cast, but by the narrow majority of sixteen. Those who opposed Mr. Swackhamer felt, that having already been in the Reeve's chair for five years, sufficient honour had been bestowed by this municipality, and it was time some other citizen who had given much time and careful attention to the welfare of the town should have an opportunity for preference. Dr. Gray was the citizen chosen and his and his friends have the satisfaction of knowing that in the contest Reeve Swackhamer was given the closest fight of his municipal experience.

When the results of the polls had been announced, Returning Officer MacKinnon was appointed chairman.

Reeve-elect Swackhamer thanked the electors for again electing him and said he expected to lead the Wardenship.

Dr. Gray, who, by the way, is a capital loser, took his defeat very philosophically. He thanked cordially the 152 citizens who had favored him with their support. He appreciated the splendid work he had received very highly. During his incumbency of office he had freely given his best services in the interests of the town. There were some matters he could have wished to have had the opportunity of controlling, but hoped the new Council would give them their earnest attention.

Councillor-elect Hynds was called and gave one of his spicy and characteristic speeches. He realized the contest had been a hot one. Now that Mr. Swackhamer was elected he hoped he would realize his anticipations and be elected Warden of the County.
