EDITORIAL NOTES

The Senate bill providing for the prohibiting of the sale of liquor within four miles of any school in Tennessee, passed the third and final reading in the Senate on Tuesday. It is expected that the house will pass the bill today. Immediately after the vote in the Senate was announced a frantic crowd surrounded the prohibition committee, and the celebration took on the form of a love feast.

The annual report of the Postmaster-General gives many interesting facts. From it we learn that there are 11,825 post offices in Canada, and that last year's mail matter was despatched from these as follows:

The increase in the number of letters carried was 21,040,000 over the previous year.

The Milton Champion says: "The changes in Nelson township may give a majority against the county good roads system and it is possible that by-law No. 22 may be repealed." It is hoped no such retrograde action will be taken by the County Council of 1900. The good roads scheme may require some changes in the matter of administration, but to repeal the by-law would surely be a serious error. It is, however, a question whether the Government, having sanctioned the by-law, and entered into contractual terms with the County to aid to the extent of one-third the cost in the construction of the good roads system, would permit the repeal of the by-law at the whim of a majority of anti-good-roads councillors.

An epoch in Ontario newspaper development has been recorded during the last year when The Toronto Daily Star jumped into first place in circulation, thus furnishing another stimulus to a record of growth that is quite unparalleled in Canadian journalism. It is only nine years since the present management assumed control. At that time the paper had a daily circulation of around 6,000, for the year 1908 it averaged over 50,000 copies a day. That the growth is still going on, and going on rapidly, is shown by the fact that the increase of 1908 over 1907 was over 8,000 copies daily. In its editorial policy The Star has gained a reputation for sanity and moderation. It has strong views it never heretofore those whose views are different.

The proclamation has been issued for a new nomination to fill the vacancy in the Council. The nomination will be held next Monday at noon. Let us enter into the matter as citizens of sound common sense and discretion. Select some good man who is able and willing to serve the municipality well and work in harmony with the members of the Council already elected. The importance of the matter should ensure the avoidance of the nonsense which has sometimes characterized nominations of this kind where numbers of persons have been proposed who have not had the remotest intention or wish of becoming candidates. If all means this vacancy should be filled by some citizen of character and ability, willing to serve, and it should be by acclamation, so that the town shall not be put to further unnecessary expense.
