**IMPROVING (?) THE CEMETERY**

Committee's Decision to Cut Down the Beautiful Groves on Monument Hill

**CITIZENS DEMAND DISCONTINUANCE**

Unfortunately the Public Progress reporter left the Council Chamber before the adjournment of the Council on Monday night of last week, and the following resolution, passed that evening, did not appear in the minutes published in last issue:

"Moved by J. Easton, seconded by A. Hall, that the Council give all the wood in the first survey of the cemetery to some persons who would be responsible to cut and clean up same and burn up all the brush, also to clean the graves and not to molest any plots which are sold; work to be under the supervision of the Mayor and Council for Easton, and to be commenced at once."

The Committee interpreted the above resolution as giving permission for cutting down all the trees in the beautiful grove on Monument Hill, and explains that as the other portions of the cemetery are filling up rapidly, they would thus secure additional ground, which by leveling and terracing would afford a considerable number of extra plots to offer for sale to the public.

With this end in view the Reeve and Councilors Easton and Denny, with axes and saws, commenced last week to fell the trees and convert them into saw logs and cordwood and sent the logs to the saw mill.

Citizens taking their weekly stroll through the cemetery on Sunday saw what was going on, and on Monday afternoon walked upon several citizens who have taken a large interest in Fairview Cemetery since it was opened, and protested strongly against what they characterized as unwarranted vandalism.

A deputization visited the cemetery during the forenoon and laid the matter of the protest before the members of the committee who were themselves at work, and strongly urged a cessation of the depredations. The committee readily assented if the feeling of the public was opposed to the course they were taking the work would at once cease.

Fortunately the trees cut were upon and bordering one or two of the roundways and with a little trimming up the cutting will not be seriously noticeable from the front of the cemetery. The beautiful pines, hemlock, ironwoods and other trees sacrificed, can, however, never be replaced.

Some commendable work could perhaps be done in clearing out any dead trees or fallen timber, and perhaps, some of the thicker underbrush, but even this should not be attempted until summer time when the leaves are out and the foliage is in its normal state.

The pretty growth of shrubs and small trees surrounding the low parts between the front and rear of the cemetery should not be removed under any consideration. They hide what, if cleared, would be an unsightly bog, and they really render it a beautiful spot all the summer with the varying foliage and successive bloom which flourish in profusion.

The committee surely read more into the resolution than it seemed to intend, but their willingness to desist from their first plan is to be commended. This committee regards Fairview Cemetery, with its beautiful grove as a back ground to the well-kept plots, and artistically laid out walks and drives, as singularly favored by nature with a more attractive environment than any other of the city could ever conceive or invent. Most people have a veneration for the beautiful spot which causes them to consider it almost a sacrilege to molest the surroundings which nature herself planted there. To the successful children and young people of the past four generations the nearest grove to town has been an unchanging rendezvous for healthful outings among God's sweet-smelling trees and shrubbery.

**ELECTRIC POWER IN A YEAR**

Action to be Supplied from Toronto With Reimbursement to Milton

**TENDERS ACCEPTED FOR \$750,000 CONTRACTS**

Tenders calling for an expenditure of \$750,000 were accepted by the Hydro-Electric Power Commission last week for the equipment of the different distributing and transformer stations in connection with the Provincial Niagara power scheme. The amount mentioned is one-third less than the estimate. This is the second great step in connection with the government's power policy, and the only remaining contract to be let for that for the erection of the buildings.

Altogether the accepted tenders affect the equipment of twelve stations. The chief will be the stepping-up station at Niagara Falls, and the others will be situated at Dundas, the inter-switching station for the whole system and the transformer station for Dundas, Hamilton and Watford; Toronto supplying Wood, Toronto, Milton, Acton, Brampton, Weston, and Mississauga; Guelph, Preston supplying Oak and Hespeler, Berlin supplying Waterloo, Elmira and New Hamburg; Stratford, St. Mary's; London supplying Port Stanley; Woodstock supplying Ingersoll, Tillamook and Norwich, and Hamilton supplying Paris, St. George and Ayr.

The municipalities will be supplied with electrical energy within a year by the Hydro-Electric Power Commission, said a leading member of the commission last week.
