**NEWS OF LOCAL IMPORT.**

**Prof. O'Brien as a Lecturer.**  
Prof. O'Brien lectured a goodly audience in the town hall on Tuesday evening with his lecture on "Palms and Phrenology." Miss Nicklin taught for a number of years with much success and then entered the Normal School, Toronto, from which she graduated with high honors, being the gold medalist of the school. Miss Nicklin will take charge of the primary department, until September, after which she will receive a permanent position on the staff in another department.

W. Barker and Mrs. Stephenson; devotional, Mrs. James Moore; social, Mrs. Frank Kennedy; Rev. G. W. Barker is the teacher. The other is a young man's class with 20 charter members. President, Nelson Hunter; Vice-President, Frank Kennedy; Secretary, Arthur Firstbrook; Treasurer, J. P. Scarrow; Con. Membership Committee, F. Webster, Jr. J. S. Coleman is the teacher. This class is known as the King's Obedience Class. Pearl Stewart and Amelia Husband have been added to the teaching staff of the school.

**A Trip Home from Gow Ganda.**  
Mr. William Patterson, who went up to Gow Ganda the first of the month, returned on Wednesday, to arrange to go into the transportation business. Most of the business enterprises there are already overdone, but the matter of transportation is still a serious problem. Mr. Patterson has purchased the outfit for a twenty-four foot launch, which he will put on Gow Ganda lake, a body of water ten miles long, which is being used during the winter as part of the pleigh road from Chatham. He is a man of very profitable patronage. Mr. Patterson says there are already about 150 houses and stores built on the site of this new village town and the population is now about 200. The claims are being staked in all directions for tea or fifteen miles. Prospecting work this winter has been very slow, owing to the depth of snow, but as soon as spring opens there will be a rush over the territory which is believed to be rich in minerals. The outfit of Messrs. Smith Brothers had not reached Gow Ganda when Mr. Patterson left.

The Elin team was assisted by Messrs. Sheahan, Keogh and Cameron, from Bolton, and Hylthe from Toronto, but they could not help the Acton boys, and the game ended at the 77. **A Big Division Court Session.**  
Judge Gorham held Division Court here last Thursday and the cases on the docket occupied the entire day in their hearing. Two cases took up most of the time of the court. Smith Bros. v. Higger & Rice, was an action by Smith Bros. claiming \$53 for a gasoline pump and engine which they installed and allege their contract was fulfilled when it would pump water satisfactorily. The defendants claimed that it was to pump to the inspection of the Underwriters' Association, which it did not and their insurance was cancelled. Decision was reserved. The lengthiest case of the day was a fine fence case, with Hugh Black as applicant and Mrs. Martin respondent. Some time ago Mrs. Martin had the fence viewers examine the line fence between her property, lot 15, con. 5, and Mr. Black's, lot 14. A survey was made by Mr. D. Hutchison. As a result the line encroached on Mr. Black's property several feet. The defendant claimed the old line by statute of limitation. Judgment was reserved. J. Lovinsky, of Georgetown, had a suit against J. Saltz over a horse deal. The case was heard by Judge J. Saltz. Lovinsky claimed the horse was not as represented and brought him back to Saltz. The latter gave him away, hence the suit. Case dismissed. H. P. Moore sued the Grand Reframer Printing Co. for \$17.00 services and expenses making expert valuation of the plant. Judgment for plaintiff with costs. In this case Mr. Hancock, the lawyer for the defendant, who was necessary for the case, went into the witness box. When he was through the Judge remarked to him, "I give judgment against you upon your own evidence."
