Deceased was a blacksmith and in young manhood operated a shop at Knatchbull. He was always of an inventive turn of mind and invented the famous Stephenson plow, which grow into great popularity. He came to Acton about the year 1817 and erganized the Acton Plow Co., for the mannfacture of the plow, and was manager of the company. Samples of the plow were exhibited at the Centental Exposition fo Philadelphia in 1870 and were awarded first price.

A few years later changing conditions in agriculture introduced the cast Iron plows and the company here want out of business Mr. A. Stophenson bought the blacksmithing business, and William shortly after invented a steam plow and went west to introduce This was quite successful and is atill largely used on the extensive farms. Other Inventions followed, notably a seed drill which was sold for

Mr. Stephenson returned from the west several years ago and seitled in threshing machine when he died, which he intended should revolution-




