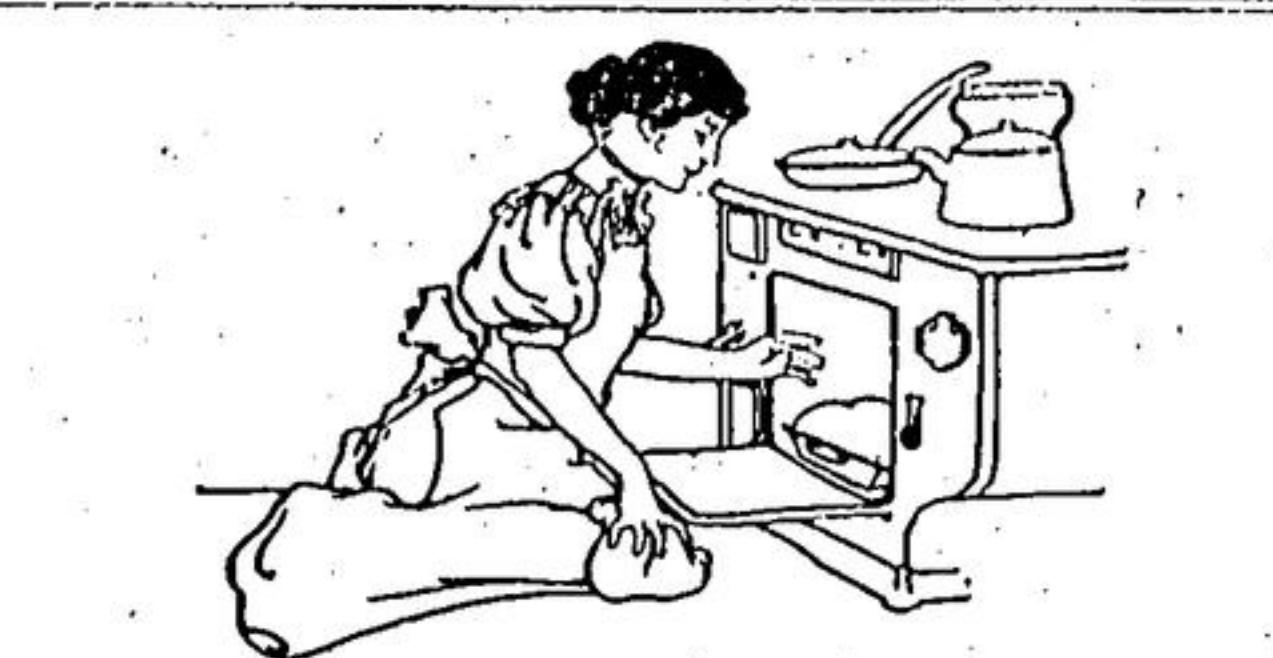
NEWS OF LOCAL IMPORT.
