The collection is one which would delight the heart of any naturalist, and will facilitate very much the study of natural history as to local birds and animals. Mr. Stark also contributed an authenticated roll of the warship "Nancy" destroyed in the Nottawasaga River in the war of 1812; the wings or posterial fin and tail of a flying fish secured in the Bay of Bengal in 1878 and two similar copies of "The Kingdoms' Weekly Intelligence," and "The London Mercury" published in 1848, the days of Cromwell, and 1888, the time of the crowning of the Prince of Orange.
