EDITORIAL NOTES

In the state of Michigan last Hatur day more than 500 saloons and ter broweries in nineteen counties, which voted to banish the bar at the last election, closed their doors. Thirty of the eighty-three countles in the state have voted out the liquor licenses.

The Oakville Record says: Good roads will yet prevail in Halton. seems a shame for an old county like Halton to be so far behind in the matter of good roads. This section of the province was fairly well settled when ploneers were blazing the roads through the forest farther west in Ontario, but to-day those western countles are yours ahead of Halton in regard to good roads.

Section 16 of the License Law Among ed Act of last session of the Legislature is a new clause and is an important one. It provides that when in any prosecution it has been proved that a person under twenty-one years of age has been supplied with liquor. such person may be compelled to state who furnished him with the liquor, and the date that it was furnished. he refuses, he may be imprisoned for a period not exceeding three months.

As a result of Local Option, license reduction and the action of license commissioners over 200 liquor bare were closed on Baturday, May 1st. Local Option came into force in 23 municipalities. It is the avowed aim of the forces arrayed against the liquor traffic to make a more extensive campalgo this year than over before. In many parts of the country campaigns have been already started, and many important places, such as Poterborough Brantford, Collingwood, Port Hope, Cohourg, Picton, Aurora and Newmarket will be in the contest.




