EDITORIAL NOTES

There has come to our editor's desk a picture postcard containing an attractive cut of a fine-looking new hotel, called the "Winchester," just opened in the town of Winchester, Ont., in which Local Option by-law is in operation. Along with the postcard is the statement that the hotel, which certainly is a credit to the town, contains thirty-eight bedrooms as part of the accommodation it provides for the travelling public. This does not look as if prohibition was a serious interference with legitimate hotel business. —The Pioneer.

The jolly vacation period is again at hand. In accordance with the spirit of the season Hesey Man's Magazine for June is a splendidly illustrated Outing Number. It is brimming of bright, breezy contributions on the timely subject of a holiday. "The Proper Way to Spend a Vacation," will be perused with much interest. Another clever sketch is on "Canada," the Summer Playground of America." There are Canadian articles of merit and instruction by expert, entertaining writers. Half a dozen short, happy stories, and the best selections from the leading publications of the world on home and business interests, make the June edition of Hesey Man's a welcome summer guest. It is readable and diverting from cover to cover.

The Department of the Interior at Ottawa has recently issued a map of that part of Canada lying west of the great lakes showing the positions of the grain elevators and flour mills together with tables showing their individual and collective capacity. In the three provinces of Manitoba, Alberta and Saskatchewan there are 650 grain elevators with an aggregate capacity of 42,968,000 bushels, while in the other provinces the number of elevators is considerably below this, the aggregate capacity being 29,007,700 bushels. The total capacity of the country of Canada amounts to 70,975,000 bushels. Manitoba has fifty four and oatmeal mills with a daily capacity of 17,003 barrels; Saskatchewan has 25 mills with a possible daily output of 3,945 barrels; while Alberta has seventeen mills with a possible output of 1,930 barrels.

In the course of his remarks at the Congregational Church on Sunday morning Rev. P. O. L. Harrel said: "I heard more swearing on the street corner in Georgetown in one hour last night than I think I ever heard before." This from an outsider does not speak well for our town, but you can't admit that there is a considerable amount of very bad language used on our streets at times, which should not be. The fact of a larger crowd than usual being in town previous to the holiday may account for some of it, but not all. Have we become so used to profanity that we do not notice it until brought to our notice by a stranger? There is a prescription in the statutes for this malady and if our town authorities don't start dealing out a little of the medicine it will not be long before we will be classed along with Acton. —Georgetown Herald. The First Princess in the historical loyalty of Acton does not share the spirit of the reference in the closing line of the Herald's article. Nevertheless as the Herald admits the prevalence of profanity on Georgetown's streets, we are obliged to state that Acton's fair name is being sadly tarnished by the small percentage of thoughtless or brazen persons who indulge in the crime of profanity on the streets. If the authorities would make an example of a few of these helious offenders the result would be most salutary.

COST OF HYDRO-ELEC. POWER
New Schedules Submitted to Clerk Mackinnon by Hydro-Electric Commission.

THE TRANSFORMER STATION AT GEORGETOWN

Municipal Clerk Mackinnon has just received from the chief engineer of the Hydro-Electric Commission the following letter:

Toronto, May 31st, 1909.

The Town Clerk, Acton, Ont.
Dear Sirs:—We are enclosing herewith a report giving the estimated prices of power to the four municipalities of Acton, Brampton, Georgetown and Milton. The two amounts of power for each municipality are those given as the maxima and minima in the resolution passed at the meeting at Georgetown, May 3rd, 1909.

On the basis of \$1,000,000.00 per annum from Georgetown and a 10,000 v. line from the H. E. P. Commission's Station at Georgetown to the four municipalities, the prices for the two quantities of power would be as follows:

COURT OF REVISION

COUNCIL MATTERS ALSO RE-CIEVE ATTENTION

Council met on Monday evening at 8 o'clock as a Court of Revision. Members present Reeve Swankhamer and Councillors Hynde, Dunn and Easton.

There were but two appeals, J. N. Taylor, appealed against assessment for a house which he claimed he did not possess. Appeal allowed.

Harry Russell, appealed against assessment of \$1000 on his brick house, lot 5, block 17. Assessment confirmed. The Assessor appealed to have the elevator of Robert Noble at the G. T. R., assessed for \$1000. The appeal was allowed, and the property added to the roll.

The assessment roll was then finally finalized and the court adjourned to meet at a council.

The council then met for regular business.

The Committee on Finance presented their cheval report and recommended the payment of the accounts.

Petitions have been presented for permanent pavements on Agnes Street, from Elgin to Frederick Street; on Willow Street from Church to Agnes Street, and on Arthur Street from Yving to Wellington Street.

The Inspector of the Boiler Insurance Co. notified that the annual inspection would be made on Tuesday, 6th June.

In order to make the inspection it will be necessary to cool the boiler and there will therefore be no light for the park for the season.

Complaints have been made to the Park Committee of submitted plans and specifications for a new bandstand for the park.

The Council will look into the matter and decide during the week.

Council adjourned at ten o'clock.
