Nothing More Acceptable Than a Gray Buede Pooket. If you have a friend who is about start on a long fourney you could make her no more acceptable parting ulft than a safety pocket to be worn under the dress. In it can go extra money and lewels without four of loss

Such pockets can be made of many materials and in several different styles, but the following one will be found generally accoptable: A pocket la made from gray suede or a piece of chamols cleven luches long, six inches wide at bottom and five inches at top. The bottom is
