THE BASIC BALL PROTEST.

Milton invited Mr. McCullum to Universe and Now They're Very Sorry.

At the meeting of the Big League in Milton, on Wednesday of last week, the Acton ball team filed a protest against Georgetown for the game played on Saturday, the 10th, which was won by Georgetown, through the unfair decisions of the umpire, Mr. McCullum.

The representatives from Acton were Mr. Ryder, Robt. Scott, Prof. McLean, A. C. Nodder, from Guelph, N. G. Irwin, Mr. McCallum, T. E. Miller, and Milton, Mr. D. Stirling, Mr. J. M. McCallum, as president, and Mr. McCallum.

After going into the matter of the protest, a vote was taken as to whether the umpire had given decisions contrary to the national rules of baseball. The result being 4-3 that the umpire's decision on one occasion, namely: Taylor running to first base, over-runs the bag, a wild throw being made to first-base, runs to second, reaches safely without again touching first-base, and is declared out by the umpire. This cost Acton one run to date.

The matter of the two batsmen being hit by pitched ball was declared to be a question alone for umpire's decision without appeal. After several arguments the motion was made by Acton's representatives to have the game thrown out, and played over, leaving the question as to where the game should take place, and an impartial umpire, to the decide of the protest. The President of the League, Mr. McGibson of Guelph, The motion was voted on and much to the surprise of the Acton men the vote resulted 4 to 2 to allow the game to stand and not be played over.

Mr. McGibson of Milton then invited Mr. McCallum to umpire the game on the following Saturday, the 20th, at Milton, between Georgetown and Milton. The result was that Georgetown again won through the erratic unpairing of Mr. McCallum, giving Milton their just reward for their direct step at Acton at the protest meeting.

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
