EDITORIAL NOTES  
The report for 1908 of the Inspector of Prisons and Public Charities shows 133 commitments to Hamilton County Jail, three of them women, an increase of 33 over the number for 1907. The cost of daily rations per prisoner was \$1.67 cents.

"First sitting ice cream and ice cream soda on Sunday, even in a restaurant, is an infringement of the Lord's Day Act, was the decision given Monday morning by Magistrate Saunders in the charge against the Guelph Quick Lunch Company. Just as the magistrates have given similar decisions all over the Dominion.

For drabble automobile laws Florida can probably take the palm. The Legislature, according to the New York Tribune, has passed bills which, among other things, provide that when an automobile, driven along a public highway, meets another vehicle, the chauffeur shall stop his machine, and if there are women or children in the other carriage, he must get out and help to guide the animals drawing it, whether they are horses, mules or oxen, safely by his machine. Most people who do not run automobiles will think the above provisions very reasonable.

Good times are evidently on deck again. Returns of the revenue and expenditure of the Dominion for the first quarter of the current fiscal year—April, May, June—have been issued by the Department of Finance, showing, as compared with the corresponding period of the fiscal year 1907-8, a marked growth in revenue. The total amount received was \$21,522,872, an increase of \$2,751,401. For the month of June, 1908, the increase was nearly a million dollars altogether in enhanced customs revenue. Experienced financiers would indicate that the increase for the current fiscal year will show an increase of at least ten millions over the fiscal year 1907-8. Indicates that good times have returned to Canada.

One of the most interesting features of a blue book which has recently been issued at Ottawa relating to the canals of the Dominion are the figures which show that the bulk of the freight traffic passing through these Canadian canals is of United States origin. The figures for 1908 showed that of the total freight passing through the canals 12,100,000 tons were from the United States, while 5,022,117 tons were Canadian goods. The total annual traffic through the canals has risen from 6,225,221 tons in 1900 to 17,302,829 in 1908. The Canadian States Government is fully alive to the serious rivalry of the Canadian route to the sea is shown by its energetic prosecution of the work of enlarging the Erie Canal which is expected to cost over a hundred million dollars.

A despatch from London yesterday says: "The extraordinary success of the Canadian riflemen in the 'almost sweeping the board' at Bielea, as one paper puts it, is the subject of great comment here. If a representative of the Maple Leaf should win the King's prize, the present will undoubtedly be known as the Canadian year. The Standard says that never has such a powerful team visited Bielea."

**CANADA WOULD REAP BENEFIT**

**By Removal of Tariffs, Says Mr. D. D. Mann, the Railroad Magnate**  
"THE SOLUTION OF THE PULP-WOOD PROBLEM."  
"It is of the opinion that the placing of iron ore, lumber, coal, and pulp on the free list by the United States Government would be of great benefit to Canada," said Mr. D. D. Mann, Vice-President of the C. N. R., in the course of an interview with a Globe representative on the tariff issue which has become such a burning question in the United States. Such a move, he thought, would help to mutual advantage and would help to build up these industries in both countries. As regards the export duty recently placed on outgoing pulpwood by the Quebec Legislature, he thought the measure was rather drastic, and that other means could be adopted which would build up the pulp industry quicker and more satisfactorily.

Canada, he said, had an inexhaustible supply of pulpwood. The present system of granting permits to lumbermen who could get into a forest and clear the whole thing up, big trees and small, was, in his opinion, wrong. He would have the several Legislative bodies in Canada allowing lumbermen to cut only such timber as was of a certain growth, leaving the small trees. All over the country there are at present great forests, Quebec, Ontario, the western Provinces, Kentucky and British Columbia had great stores of spruce. In all of these there were a certain number of trees which had become "ripe," and were ready to cut. There were also a great number of young trees which should be allowed to stand. If the lumbermen were forced by law to leave these young trees until they had attained growth, there would be a perpetual crop every fifteen years or so, and a crop of great magnitude out of each Province each year.

The supply of pulpwood here would never be exhausted so long as the Government protected the forests against fire, and forced the lumber people to cut only such trees as had attained their full market value. In that way, he continued, Canada would have the pulp manufactured in Canada to a certain extent, and the consumer across the line would be satisfied.

**SHERIFF CLEMENTS DEAD**  
He Was Sheriff of Hamilton County for Twenty-Six Years  
Mr. Matthew Clements, Sheriff of this county, died at his residence at Milton, on Monday afternoon, after an illness extending over several weeks, heart failure being the immediate cause of death.  
The late Sheriff was in his 83rd year, and was appointed by the Ontario Government in 1883 on the resignation of the late Hon. Gen. O. McKimney. Prior to his appointment as Sheriff Mr. Clements held many municipal offices and was Warden of the county. He was a man of the highest character, and was held in the greatest esteem not only by the legal profession but by all classes in the community. He was for many years an official and a very useful member of the Methodist Church.  
Two sons and a daughter survive, his wife having died several years ago.
