EDITORIAL NOTES

Lord Strathearn in Montreal spoke most hopefully of the prospects of rapid progress for the Dominion of Canada. He is thoroughly in touch with the movement of capital in Great Britain toward this country.

At the last meeting of the County Council by-laws were given that were all readings and passed to pay the respective amount of county good roads expenses from the county good roads account within their limits as follows:

Action \$15.70, Burlington \$151.50, Georgetown \$122.81, Milton \$102.01, and Oakville \$551.60. A by-law was also passed empowering the County Council to loan a debenture for \$10,000 for four months to meet expenditures on good roads.

The annual report of the Land Revenue Department of the Dominion for the fiscal year shows a considerable falling off in the production of spirits, due, doubtless, to the financial stringency and the consequent economizing by liquor and tobacco users. The quantity of spirits produced during the twelve months was 5,170,018 gallons, a decrease of 1,173,715 gallons, or about twenty-five per cent, as compared with the previous fiscal year.

A delegation from Action Fire Brigade, headed by Messrs. McEachern and Gaudie, reported that they had made a survey of the town, the fire tanks, etc., and recommend that for adequate protection an addition to the hose be made, or several new tanks be constructed.

A special meeting of the Council will be held during the week to consider this and other matters.
