EDITORIAL NOTES

The Canadian Federation of Labor has adopted a resolution asking the Government to coin half-cent pieces. The coinage of half-cent pieces was argued on the ground that it would be a better medium than the one which would appreciate the value of a half-cent, in cases where purchases involved fractional amounts of a cent.

Dominion trade returns as issued at Ottawa continue to show steady and encouraging gains upon the figures of last year. The figures for August have just been made public and the statement of total trade for the month shows an increase of over seven and a half million dollars when compared with the figure of last year. Total imports for the month showed a gain of over seven million dollars while exports of mining products gained by \$10,301. Another remarkable gain is shown forth in customs returns which totalled \$5,351,571, an increase over the same month last year of almost twenty per cent.

A Local Option campaign is on at Georgetown and the Herald "has no hesitation in saying that the issue should be given careful consideration from every point of view." Furthermore, "the Herald appeals for a sober and considerate approach to the subject, and for every taxpayer and with him those who are not yet in full in holding that the outcome, whatever it may be, will prove to be in the best interests of the community, whose welfare we all honestly desire to promote." The attention given to "labor day" in religious journals is a good omen, says the United Presbyterian. "Prominence was given to articles, editorial or contributed, sometimes both speaking of the sympathetic and approving tone of the labor day meetings by labor organizations for alleviating the conditions under which many laborers are yet compelled to exist. There appears to be a growing recognition on the part of labor organization that the churches and parishes are their friends and co-workers in all lawful efforts for the improvement of the conditions of toilers of all kinds. The labor organizations of Canada are in full accord with the work of the Lord's Day Alliance and invites the officers of the alliance to address their annual gathering.

The Kingston Newsway: "The retail merchants were called on last night by the executive committee of the Young People's Society in regard to the closing of stores at ten o'clock on Saturday nights." This is a worthy move in the right direction. In a number of Canadian towns the merchants have already adopted for Saturday night the plan of declining to deliver any goods ordered after eight o'clock, and closing their stores at nine o'clock. In every instance this reasonable business method has won favor of customers, clerks, delivery men and merchants. In many cities and towns all of the stores along the largest business street close at eleven on Saturday evening. They are to find it a good policy to give their employees freedom from labor on that evening. Every Canadian merchant would close his business at least three hours before midnight every Saturday, and make no deliveries after eight o'clock. It would meet with very general approval! - Lord's Day Advocate. It would be a boon to Action merchants and their salesmen and delivery boys if such a course were taken here.

BUCCONISFUL CONCERT AT NIGHT

Action is almost invariably fortunate in the choice of dates for the Fall Fair here and the result is always a success in public interest, attendance, size of entertainment and financial results.

The Fair on Tuesday and yesterday was in all respects gratifying, and the results put the officers and directors in splendid good humor.

Tuesday, the secretary and his aides were kept busy with the abundance of entries which crowded in all the forenoon and until two o'clock in the afternoon. The directors placed the exhibits in the hall to such advantage that it never before presented a more attractive display. In nearly all departments the entries were in excess of previous years. The showing of fruit, grain and vegetables excepted, was particularly well up to the policy and military departments. The numerous specks in both these classes enhanced very materially the appearance of this section of the hall. In ladies' work there was a very fine array of the handiwork of the fair sex, but not quite so large possibly as that of last year, which was declared by many to be equal to most of the county fairs. In fine arts, however, the entries were far in advance of any previous year, and the space required taxed a very large section of one side of the hall, with an array of highly finished productions in the class.

A number of the appeals were of course entered by the political leaders of the two parties, but the bulk of them were presented by Mr. A. J. Lehman, proprietor of the Dominion Hotel, for the liquor interests, and by the Citizens' Committee elected at the recent mass meeting of electors to advance the interests of Local Option for Action.

The proprietors of the licensed bars in town evidently considered that their "craft was in danger," inasmuch as they were constrained to go to the expense of employing Mr. James P. Hawson, K. C., the well-known counsel, who is in constant demand throughout the province for defending liquor dealers and proprietors of licensed bar rooms when charged with violations of the liquor laws. They also went to the trouble of serving special subpoenas upon a number of non-resident voters in Toronto and elsewhere, but they omitted to demand the cash necessary to call witnesses, nothing but these voters naturally refused to obey the summons. In each of these cases the appeal was disallowed.
