REV. F. G. BURRELL, ORDAINED

Interesting Services in the Baptist Church on Tuesday

NUMEROUS PARTIES AND DELEGATES PRESENT.

Services both unique and interesting in character were held in the Baptist Church on Tuesday afternoon and evening, when Rev. F. G. Burrell, B.A., who has been the pastor since last spring, came up for ordination.

The services opened at three o'clock with Rev. B. Goodfield, Minister, Moderator of the Baptist Association presiding. Rev. David of Orange, Deacon, was appointed Clerk of the council.

In extending the hospitality of the Acton Church and expressing the pleasure felt at the meeting of the Council here at this time, Mr. J. L. Warren, Clerk of the Church, remarked that it was 67 years last April since the last Council was held in the Baptist Church, Acton. On that occasion the late Rev. H. R. Cook, his predecessor and set apart for the ministry. One of the delegates who attended that Council was present and a member of the Council—Mr. Robert Bessey, of Georgetown. He thought Mr. Bessey was the only member of the former Council now living. He is in his 80th year.

After roll call Rev. Mr. Burrell, the candidate for ordination, was called upon to relate evidence of his conversion and call to the Christian ministry. He was then examined as to his doctrinal beliefs, to each of which he was lucid and emphatic in his answers and also gave clear and explicit definitions of the nature and relation of God, and the relation of Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit, forming the Trinity, and other matters of doctrine and polity.

The Council then retired and subsequently a resolution was passed accepting Mr. Burrell as a fit and proper person to be ordained to the sacred office of the ministry of the Church of God. The interesting ceremony of ordination by laying on of hands followed.

Between the afternoon and evening services the delegates were entertained by the ladies of the Church.

At the evening service the Church was crowded to the doors. Rev. Dr. Graham, of Toronto, preached a very forcible and eloquent sermon. Rev. Joseph Jones, B.A., of Berlin, delivered the charge to the Church; Rev. C. E. Burrell, of Hamilton, brother of the pastor, delivered the charge to the candidate; the ordination prayer was offered by Rev. Thomas Trotter, D.D., of McMaster University, Toronto, and the hand of fellowship was extended by Rev. T. Watson, of East Missouri.

The services were full of interest throughout and mark a red letter day in the history of the Baptist Church here.

SMITH TROPHY REMAINS HERE

Splendid Bowling Tournament on Monday with Ten Pins in Competition

ERIN AND ACTON IN THE FINALS

The Smith Trophy was bowled for and won for the second time by St. John's team, skippered by W. J. Gould, at the tournament on Monday on the green here. With a perfect day for bowling and the green in excellent condition, some very keen contests resulted, in which some strong runs went down to defeat.

One of the surprises of the day was the defeat of Mayne, Tom Thaumur, strong bowler skipper by Campbell, in the first round; also that of Eliz. Burrows' creek Hamilton team, which won the Herald Trophy for that city a few weeks ago, in which some fifty runs competed.

Another very noticeable feature of the morning games was the leading of the elderly gentleman on Revere Hynd's team, which went down to defeat before lunch of Kinn.

The second round of the Trophy was a repetition of the first; a win of each club being still in the race. It was in this round that Mr. Edwin Burrows' team met defeat at the hands of Bush of Erin, after a hard game. Lawson's team, which went down to the last, had some fifty runs.

The third round settled down to three runs, Lawson of Brantford, Bush of Erin and Gould of Acton. In the final round the two teams, which went down to the last, Lawson and Gould started in the semi-final game in which Lawson gave Gould a hard battle, the game being in doubt until the last bowl was played. Lawson being two down on the last end and tying four shots when Gould went to play his last bowl. Gould won his own game by making a perfect draw for second shot, thus winning by one.

The final game between Bush and Gould was a keen one and was an exceedingly good game. Up to the twenty-first end each club alternated with not more than a run advantage, when the Action rock took away a run, which Bush was unable to overcome, Gould finally winning by nine shots.

The final game caused a great deal of interest, being bounded by a couple of rows of spectators. Through the kindness of Mr. W. A. Storey in having the firm's electric sign lighted, along with the aid of the light on the green, the toboggan for 1910 was ended that evening with much satisfaction.
